VI. COURSE GOALS: In this course students develop effective communications skills in Spanish appropriate to this stage of language study and expand their knowledge of language and culture.

VII GENERAL EXPECTATIONS:

- **Students are expected to attend all classes;** they are expected to **arrive on time** and to remain in class for the **entire 1 hour and 15 minutes. THREE TARDIES equal ONE ABSENCE.** There are **NO** "excused" absences; for **EACH** absence in excess of two, **one point** will be deducted from the student's **final grade average.** In other words, **a student may miss two class meetings without penalty.**
- Students are expected to maintain classroom decorum. Any behavior deemed disruptive by the instructor will result in your being asked to leave class. Such an event is an **unexcused absence** and the student may be referred to the dean of students for further action.
- **Classes will start on time.** If for some reason you find it necessary to arrive late, you will be responsible for all information, including announcements or changes to the syllabus, etc., made during your absence. If you are absent for the entire class period, you are also responsible for all assignments and other announcements made during the class meeting. You are, therefore, strongly advised to ask another student for his/her email address and telephone number.
- Class time will be used to develop all four basic skills (listening comprehension, speaking, reading comprehension, and writing) and will include cultural information. However, a special emphasis will be put on speaking. **You are expected to study and practice at home as part of your daily preparation. The MAESTRO assignments are part of preparation.**
- All assignments, whether written or oral, are to be finished by the time class begins. **NO late homework will be accepted.** Documented emergencies will be handled on an individual basis.
- **NO make-up tests or assignments will be given.** A grade of "0" will be assigned for ALL work not turned in or any tests not taken. There will be no "extra credit." Documented emergencies will be handled on an individual basis.
- **Turn OFF all** cell phones, beepers, pagers and any other potentially disruptive noise makers when you arrive in class. You will NOT be allowed to have them at your desk during testing; place them on MY desk until the class is over. The use of **any other** electronic equipment such as I Pods, radios, laptops, etc. is prohibited during class time.

VIII. GENERAL POLICIES:

Academic Integrity: Any student found to be cheating or submitting someone else's work as the student's own work (in accordance with Student Life Regulations 1.A) will receive a minimal punishment of a grade of "F" in this course, with a letter to the registrar stating that the grade was awarded for academic dishonesty.

This professor considers it a breach of academic integrity for you to use automatic translators of any kind to complete an assignment. Furthermore, your professor believes that no compositions or other work should be written or edited for you by a native speaker of the target language, by a tutor or student assistant in the SONY Lab, or by any other individual. Write in Spanish from the beginning, and work on your errors as you grow in linguistic competence.

Construct passages of written Spanish at the levels detailed in the USG standards

SPEAKING

- Enter into basic dialogues with classmates. Describe themselves, their families, and routine activities today, yesterday, tomorrow. Be able to give a few statements about the past.
- Reproduce learned material in talking about what they are doing today, what they did yesterday, and what they are going to do tomorrow.
- Have a command of interrogative words and be able to use them correctly.
- Start formulating opinions about predictable events.

LISTENING

- When listening to a simple story, be able to distinguish between what they did and what they used to do.
- Understand many classroom directions and re-combinations of set phrases.
- Understand simple summaries of last week, yesterday, and what we used to do.

READING

- Read short segments of prose with familiar vocabulary.
- Read and explain simple weather reports, movie ads, travel information.

WRITING

- Write short notes to classmates about plans for the weekend or descriptions of last weekend.
- Write descriptions of classroom activities, including assigned vocabulary and re-combinations of assigned phrases.
- Write descriptions of self, family, holidays, travel, daily activities. Write about things that happened when they were children, yesterday, and plans for next summer.

X. FINAL GRADE PLAN: (Subject to change or adaptation.)

The Final grade plan is calculated on:

1. THE QUALITY OF THE STUDENT'S WORK in these activities:

Grading Scale: 100-90%=A; 89-80%=B; 79-70%=C; 69-60%=D; 59% and below=F

Note: The **mid-term grade** is neither reported at mid-term, nor is it half of the work we expect from you. It is not a grade that is calculated as part of your final grade. All tests are cumulative, i.e. they cover all material discussed to date.

Students are responsible for **all announcements and assignments** made in class, even if not listed on the syllabus. Students are expected to resolve grading questions within one week of the return of the graded material, during office hours only.

Assignments may not be made up. There are no make-up tests.

Each additional unexcused absence brings your final grade down ONE POINT!! (This could cause you to drop as much as one letter grade.)
